2007 - That was then...

- 11,000 deaths from general exposure
- 700 deaths from specific workplace exposure
- 54 premature deaths each year in UK hospitality industry employees



2017 - ...this is now

- Smoking in public has been denormalised. For most people, it is no longer perceived to be acceptable behaviour.
- Smokefree workplaces and public environments have transformed health risks that people face
- Point of sale ban and standard packs, have ensured that tobacco products as well as tobacco smoke are largely hidden from view.
- Smokefree compliance is virtually universal



2017 - ...this is now

- 6.3 million adults still smoke in England
- 88% of public still feel that secondhand smoke has an significant impact child health.
- 25% of persons still exposed to second-hand smoke
- 50% of young persons (16 to 24years) still reporting exposure to second-hand smoke
- Shisha premises still main non-compliance area
- ■80% of prison population estimated as smokers
- Smoking prevalence down to 15.5% (from 21%)



Smokefree Regulations

- 1. Smokefree (Premises & Enforcement) Regulations.
- 2. Smokefree (Signs) Regulations (Revoked).
- Smokefree (Penalties & Discounted Amounts) Regulations.
- 4. Smokefree (Exemptions & Vehicles) Regulations.
- 5. Smokefree (Vehicles Operators & Penalty Notices) Regulations.



Smokefree (Signs) Regs 2012

- Prescriptive 2007 Smokefree (Signs) Regulations revoked
- At least one legible no-smoking sign to be displayed in smoke-free vehicles
- At least one legible no-smoking sign to be displayed in smoke-free premises



Children & Families Act 2014

- This Act amended 2006 Health Act
- Protect children when travelling is private vehicles
- At least one legible no-smoking sign to be displayed in smoke-free vehicles
- At least one legible no-smoking sign to be displayed in smoke-free premises



Smokefree Enforcement – The Leicester Approach

- Public Safety Team (PST) Lead on smokefree for Leicester City Council
- New premises Planning
- Signs/Labelling Trading Standards
- Smoking in vehicles City wardens
- Smoking Shelters/Shisha premises PST
- Public Safety LCC Public Health



Smoking

- Smoking in smokefree premises/vehicles is an offence
- Monitor, take notes/photos before acting
- Offer advice on how to comply
- Keep safe Don't put yourself at risk!
- Issue FPN only for clear offences
- Non-compliance Take action/Refer to PST
- Get help/advice before taking action if unsure



What's happened in Leicester since 2007?

- 99% Smokefree compliance in Leicester achieved
- Nationally recognised smoking shelter guidance developed, circulated and recently reviewed again
- All regulatory services have delegated powers to enforce legislation
- -10 successful prosecutions taken by Authority
- •589 FPN's served for persons smoking is work vehicles



Smoking in Vehicles

Fixed Penalty Notices Issued by LCC:

2012 - 143

2013 - 283

2014 - 60

2015 - 13

2016 - 40

2017 - 50

Total - 589 = Total Fines in excess of £17,000



Shisha premises – A special case?





- Only premises where smoking is still allowed for long periods 'legally'
- Worse if not equivalent to smoking a cigarette
- -Aimed at children/students
- More complaints about children being sold shisha



Shisha premises – A special case?

- -3 raids carried out of 'underground' shisha premises
- Joint exercise with HRMC yielded 153kg of illegal shisha tobacco
- -2017 HMRC/TS day of action resluted 20kg shisha tobacco being seized.
- -3 fires in shisha premises

2014 Joint Exercise

- The Public Safety Team carried out a joint exercise with the HMRC and the Police in 2014.
- In 6 premises there were health and safety
- and fire safety issues.
- In 5 premises non-duty paid tobacco was found on the premises.
- HMRC seized over 153kgs of shisha tobacco



2014 Joint Exercise

Palm Lounge - 15.2 kg = £2849.29

Shisha Café - 39.95 kg = £7488.77

Al Majilis - 58.1 kg = £10891.05

Vanilla Pod - 13.4 kg = £2511.88

Café Chimini - 26.5 kg = £4967.52

Total amount seized = 153.15 KILOS

Total duty + VAT not paid = £28708.51

Shisha Smoking – Health risks

- Hazardous particles can build up gradually during shisha pipe use to reach dangerously high levels and presents a serious health risk.
- Exposure to secondhand smoke has immediate health effects. It can reduce lung function; exacerbate respiratory problems; trigger asthma attacks; reduce coronary blood flow; irritate eyes; and cause headaches, coughs, sore throats, dizziness and nausea.
- There is no safe level of exposure to tobacco
 smoke

- Carbon monoxide The hidden killer
- DOH Difficult to know exactly how much carbon monoxide one cigarette produced, due to the differences in smokers' inhalations.



DOH tests measured carbon monoxide in exhaled breath gave the following results in parts per million):

Normal level 3 ppm - less than 1% of blood not working properly Light smoker 10-20 ppm - 2-4% of blood not working properly Heavy smoker 30-40 ppm - 5-7% of blood not working properly Faulty boiler/fire levels upwards of 100 ppm Severe symptoms 100 ppm Lethal levels more than 300 ppm

The study found shisha smokers had 40-70 ppm of CO in their breath affecting 8-12% of their blood.



- Another study showed that compared to smoking a single cigarette, 45 minutes of water pipe smoking doubles carbon monoxide and triples nicotine exposure.
- It is well known that high levels of carbon monoxide can lead to brain damage and unconsciousness.



- Other health risks from shisha smoking include communicable disease, such as Hepatitus A and Tuberculosis, due to sharing the mouth piece of the shisha pipe.
- Shisha smokers are five times more likely than non-smokers to contract lung cancer and show signs of gum disease.



Shisha premises – Energing Issues?

- Long term public health issues like 'Marlborough Man' Aimed at young persons/students
- •Under age sales Start them early!
- Close to schools/colleges
- Herbal shisha is nicotine free!
- E-shisha safer alternative?
- New 'compliant shelter designs



Shisha premises – Challenges

- Smokefree legislation
- Age of sale
- Fire safety
- Health warnings
- Tobacco product display, labelling, signs
- Tobacco Imported illegally and sold without duty
- Public awareness/lack of education



Shisha Enforcement Update

- Birmingham CC Smoking shisha tobacco? Magistrates given doubt customers were smoking e-shisha – Case dismissed (did not believe council officers or Police)
- Leicester CC When is a ceiling a wall?
- Leeds CC 2 prosecutions of same owner
- LB Tower Hamlets 21 illegal premises
- LB Ealing £19,000 fine
- Sheffield CC 3 prosecutions/Injunction
- Preston CC Managers prosecuted & £5K fine for offences under the Serious Crime Act 2007 for providing facilities and equipment



Brexit Perspective

- Ongoing negotiations Until concluded, the UK remains a full member of the EU and all legislation remains in force.
- Future tobacco control measures will need to reflect the new environment in which tobacco control will be delivered.
- Following exit Government will review and reappraise if existing law still protects the nation's health.



Brexit Perspective contd...

- Sensibly deregulation only if needed.
- Tobacco Products Directive as it applies to e-cigarettes will be reviewed.
- The government will assess if current regulatory framework strikes the right balance between protection/enforcement
- Review measures and activities which are affected by the UK's exit from the EU, including the identification of de-regulatory measures that further health objectives,
- Advice Provide information and leaflets as requested during visits, in communications or by phone



The Real Agenda:

- Lack for central government action re shisha premises.
- Lack of Public Health England guidance/promised toolkit
- Lack of HMRC support regarding non-duty paid shisha tobacco
- Lack of action by CIEH to lobby government for change
- LA's having to their own thing for the last decade
- No clear public health research/guidance into ill effects of shisha smoking for public consumption
- Shisha licencing/legislation not even on the agenda
- This is a ticking public health time bomb!
