

Report – The circular economy at work: Jobs and skills for London's low carbon future

The potential economic growth and job opportunities for the circular economy over the next decade are immense. If London's businesses, policymakers and communities work together to adopt a circular economy and achieve the targets outlined in the <u>Mayor's Environment</u> <u>Strategy</u>, this could create an additional 284,000 jobs by 2030.






Using current employment data and a methodology we developed for a report in 2015, we estimate that the government could help to create over 450,000 jobs in the circular economy by 2035. An ambitious approach to reuse, repair and remanufacturing would also lead to jobs being created more evenly across the regions of the UK. The circular economy is growing in popularity among businesses and policymakers as a means to reach climate goals. By increasing the reuse and regeneration of products and materials, a total of 7 to 8 million new jobs can be created. However, the new report, *Decent Work in the Circular Economy: An Overview of the Existing Evidence Base,* identifies knowledge gaps which may hinder the creation of new employment opportunities.










Repair Week - Highlights




