




Are you having trouble recruiting or retaining staff? (over the past 12 months)





Do you operate a shift system for the maintenance garage?(Please tick all that apply)

UK pump and wholesale fuel prices over time


Latest prices in pence per litre for unleaded petrol and diesel


Key Points: Trust and Satisfaction

- 1. Public trust marginally smaller than last year but remains high vs national government.
- 2. They trust you <u>much</u> more to spend their taxes than national government.
- 3. Satisfaction levels with many specific services remain high, despite this year's challenges


Key Points: Current and future challenges

- 1. Councils are the most trusted to provide and deliver services in people's local area.
- 2. Councils also the most trusted to make decisions regarding local planning.
- 3. Climate change still a high priority, closely following affordable housing, social care, and road maintenance.

Enough of your taxes spent in your area?




Key fact 2 : People trust Councils with their tax




Satisfaction levels vary between services

Context

- Decades of centralisation
- Policy pressure build-up
- Austerity reducing resources
- COVID
- Breaking point
- Fix system

Revitalising Local Government

- Constitutionally enshrined
- Clarity over spheres of governance
- Clear devolution framework
- Devolution bills
- National Governance Committees

Sustainable Finance

- A long-term sustainable finance settlement
- · Minimum guaranteed % of GDP
- LG sector decides how funding is allocated
- Revaluation of council tax and business rates
- Ability to raise local tax base hypothecated
- During transition multi-year settlement
- No competitive bidding formula

Workforce

- Duty for workforce to be representative of local communities by 2030
- Natural linked system of pay across public sector
- · New career pathways for sector
- Direct delivery, default option

Roles and Powers

- LG determines its own structures, service delivery etc.
- In England standing commission on reorganisation to hear proposals
- All place-based services should be under LG

Local Democracy

- Political models, local decision
- Strengthen scrutiny local public accounts committees
- Cllrs truly representative of diverse communities
- Better remuneration, training and support

Inequality and communities

- Adopt a principle of care
- Long-term impact, future generations
- Public sector equality duty meaningful impact assessments
- · Individual Cllr budgets
- · Council spend for CWB

Fix the system - step change - or incrementally

Conclusions

- Budgets appear more stable but cumulative effect
- Sector response been good in terms of cost reduction, efficiency and improving productivity
- Public **currently** supportive of most services
- Society changing and adapting
- Need to fight for funding
- And better system of funding
